



Germany's share of GDP from industrial production is highest of Western industrialized countries, making it the largest manufacturer in Europe






Installed base of Additive Manufacturing Systems









Japanese Projects in Germany by Business Activity (2010-2014*)





Direct Flights between Japan and Germany




Direct flights are offered to the 3 biggest Japanese cities Tokyo, Osaka and Nagoya.


