#### SUMMARY

The present programme is a continuation of two previous actions implemented in the periods 2003-2007 and 2009-2017 respectively providing training in Financial and Contractual Procedures in the framework of the 9<sup>th</sup>, 10th and 11<sup>th</sup> EDF.

The overall objective of the programme is to facilitate the continuation and provision of training programmes which is an essential element for the sound and efficient management of EDF resources in the light of decentralised management and in the context of the European Commission de-concentration process.

The Action will enable National Authorising Officers' (NAOs) and Regional Authorising Officers' (RAOs) staff as well as Commission staff in ACP EU Delegations to better understand the main functioning of the EDF and consequently how to make full and adequate use of its financing resources.

#### 1 CONTEXT

#### 1.1 Sector/Country/Regional context/Thematic area

The European Development Fund (EDF) is the main instrument for providing Community aid for development cooperation in the African, Caribbean and Pacific (ACP) states and overseas countries and territories (OCTs).

Since the conclusion of the first partnership convention in 1964, the EDF cycles have generally followed the partnership agreement/convention cycles.

• 1st EDF: 1959-1964;

- 2nd EDF: 1964-1970 (Yaoundé I Convention);
- 3rd EDF: 1970-1975 (Yaoundé II Convention);
- 4th EDF: 1975-1980 (Lomé I Convention);
- 5th EDF: 1980-1985 (Lomé II Convention);
- 6th EDF: 1985-1990 (Lomé III Convention);
- 7th EDF: 1990-1995 (Lomé IV Convention);
- 8th EDF: 1995-2000 (Lomé IV Convention and the revised Lomé IV);
- 9th EDF: 2000-2007 (Cotonou Agreement);
- 10th EDF: 2008-2013 (Revised Cotonou Agreement);
- 11th EDF: 2014-2020 (Revised Cotonou Agreement).

The EDF is funded by the Member States according to a specific contribution and is subject to its own financial rules being managed by a specific Committee.

The EDF system can be considered a highly evolved example of decentralised management. Executive powers have to a great extent been conferred on the ACP States by successive Lomé Conventions and by the Cotonou Agreement including its revisions. The bulk of the funding available implemented via project approach is administered by the concerned countries themselves in the form of programmes and projects. The Commission's main role is to take financing decisions in respect of financing agreements concluded with the beneficiary countries. These agreements assign the beneficiary countries considerable responsibility for decentralised management, though the EU's Heads of Delegations and the European Commission's headquarters departments provide back-up and exercise ex-ante and ex-post supervision.

#### • The 11th EDF (the current state)

Geographical cooperation with the ACP countries under the 11th EDF is governed by the ACP-EC Partnership Agreement signed in Cotonou in 2000 and revised in Luxembourg in 2005 and again revised in Ouagadougou in 2010.

The 11<sup>th</sup> EDF was created by an intergovernmental agreement signed in June 2013 – as it is not part of the EU Budget – and entered into force on the 1<sup>st</sup> March 2015, after ratification by all Member States. There are only minor modifications in the 11<sup>th</sup> EDF compared to the 10<sup>th</sup> EDF. Mainly, Member States' contributions keys to the Fund are further aligned with the keys used for the EU budget. Furthermore, it aims to ensure more flexibility and fast reaction in case of unexpected events. Regional funding also includes allocations to cover unforeseen needs with a regional dimension and a new shock-absorbing scheme is set up to help ACP countries to mitigate the short-term effects of exogenous shocks such as economic crisis or natural disaster.

The total financial resources of the 11th EDF amount to EUR 30.5 billion for the period 2014-2020.

For this period the two main channels of EU assistance to the ACP countries will remain distinct: funds from the EU General Budget and funds from the EDF. Different administrative rules and decision-making structures apply to these two forms of aid. Funds from the EU General Budget are administered in accordance with the general Financial Regulations. Funds from the EDF meanwhile are administered according to the rules laid down by the Cotonou Agreement and subsequent relevant documents. The implementing rules and procedures for both funding sources are however mainly aligned.

The present action is a continuation of two previous actions implemented in the periods 2003-2007 and 2009-2017 respectively with the purposes of providing training in Financial and Contractual Procedures in the framework of the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> EDF.

This service provided to the NAO is considered crucial, especially taking into consideration situations of turnover in the NAOs' staff (as well as in European Commission delegations' staff) from one side, and updates and changes in EC procedures on the other.

The provision of training is considered essential for the sound and efficient management of EDF resources in the light of decentralised management and in the context of EC devolution. It enables NAO and RAO staff, as well as European Commission staff, to better understand the main functioning of the EDF and its rules and procedures.

The implementation of the two mentioned prior actions has shown extremely valuable for the sound implementation of development programmes.

#### 4 DESCRIPTION OF THE ACTION

#### 4.1 Objectives/results

The overall objective of the programme of which this action document is part is to facilitate and provide training programmes which are essential for the sound and efficient management of EDF resources in the light of decentralised management and in the context of European Commission devolution. It will enable National Authorising Officers' (NAOs) and Regional Authorising Officers' (RAOs) staff as well as European Commission staff to better understand the main functioning of the 11th EDF and consequently how to make full and correct use of its financing resources.

#### 4.2 Main activities

The project aims at the design and preparation of a series of courses on "Financial and Contractual Procedures in the framework of the EDF".

The target groups for the training courses will be the staff of the NAOs and RAOs. Depending on availability it will also be open for the staff of the EU Delegations.

The training courses will be in English and French, and Portuguese (if needed) depending on the language of the ACP country in which the training is delivered.

Preparation of training courses and corresponding teaching materials in French and English and Portuguese if needed.

The main activity is the provision of training services for the beneficiary countries' responsible staff. The main activities will be:

- Design, preparation and revision/update of the training courses and corresponding teaching materials, for the different modules in English and French, and Portuguese if needed.
- Provision of training courses in the ACP countries at the request of the National and Regional Authorising Officers.

#### 4.3 Intervention logic

The courses will take place in all the ACP countries where the National Authorising Officers (NAOs) or Regional Authorising Officers (RAOs) request these training services.

#### 5 IMPLEMENTATION

### 5.1 Financing agreement

In order to implement this action, it is not foreseen to conclude a financing agreement with the partner country, referred to in Article 17 of Annex IV to the ACP-EU Partnership Agreement.

### 5.2 Indicative implementation period

The indicative operational implementation period of this action, during which the activities described in section 4.2 will be carried out and the corresponding contracts and agreements implemented, is 60 months from the date of adoption by the Commission of this Action Document.

Extensions of the implementation period may be agreed by the Commission's authorising officer responsible by amending this decision and the relevant contracts and agreements; such amendments to this decision constitute non-substantial amendment in the sense of Article 9(4) of Regulation (EU) 2015/322.

#### 5.7 Organisational set-up and responsibilities

The service contract will be managed by the responsible unit in the Directorate-General for International cooperation and Development (DG DEVCO).

#### 5.8 Performance monitoring and reporting

The day-to-day technical and financial monitoring of the implementation of this action will be a continuous process and part of the implementing contractor responsibilities. To this aim, the implementing partner or contractor shall establish a permanent internal, technical and financial monitoring system for the action and elaborate regular progress reports (not less than annual) and final reports. Every report shall provide an accurate account of implementation of the action, difficulties encountered, changes introduced, as well as the degree of achievement of its results (outputs and direct outcomes) as measured by corresponding indicators, using as reference the

logframe matrix. The report shall be laid out in such a way as to allow monitoring of the means envisaged and employed and of the budget details for the action. The final report, narrative and financial, will cover the entire period of the action implementation.

The Commission may undertake additional project monitoring visits both through its own staff and through independent consultants recruited directly by the Commission for independent monitoring reviews (or recruited by the responsible agent contracted by the Commission for implementing such reviews).

#### 5.9 Evaluation

Having regard to the nature of the action, evaluation(s) will not be carried out for this action or its components.

In case an evaluation is not foreseen, the Commission may, during implementation, decide to undertake such an evaluation for duly justified reasons either on its own decision or on the initiative of the partner.

The evaluation reports shall be shared with the partner country and other key stakeholders. The implementing partner and the Commission shall analyse the conclusions and recommendations of the evaluations and, where appropriate, in agreement with the partner country, jointly decide on the follow-up actions to be taken and any adjustments necessary, including, if indicated, the reorientation of the project.

The financing of the evaluation shall be covered by another measure constituting a financing decision.

#### **5.10** Audit

Without prejudice to the obligations applicable to contracts concluded for the implementation of this action, the Commission may, on the basis of a risk assessment, contract independent audits or expenditure verification assignments for one or several contracts or agreements.

The financing of the audit shall be covered by another measure constituting a financing decision.

#### 5.11 Communication and visibility

Communication and visibility of the EU is a legal obligation for all external actions funded by the EU.

This action shall contain communication and visibility measures which shall be based on a specific Communication and Visibility Plan of the Action, to be elaborated at the start of implementation and supported with the budget indicated in section 5.6 above.
