II. OBJECTIVE AND RATIONALE OF THE TC

2.1 The objective of this technical cooperation (TC) operation is to support the Government of Guatemala in preparation of the National Strategy for Reducing Emissions through Avoided Deforestation and Forest Degradation (REDD+) (the "Strategy"), building on the outcomes achieved in the first phase (see paragraphs 2.3 to 2.5) and rounding out certain areas in need of strengthening in

relation to: (i) deepening consultation and engagement with local actors; (ii) strengthening the Strategy's linkage to the forestry and agriculture sector policy framework; (iii) aligning the Strategy with public and budgetary planning; and (iv) consolidating the benefit sharing mechanism; (v) incorporating gender considerations and cultural relevance into the Strategy; and (vi) designing systems and methodologies for the measurement, monitoring, and reporting of emissions associated with REDD+.

- 2.2 The country recently signed a <u>letter of intent with the Carbon Fund of the Forest</u> <u>Carbon Partnership Facility</u> (FCPF)¹ to access financial compensation for emission reductions of 10.5 million tons of CO₂ equivalent. Moreover, the country's Investment Plan with the Forest Investment Program (FIP) <u>has been approved</u> for US\$24 million, along with a US\$4.5 million grant from the FIP Dedicated Grant Mechanism for Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities, both for the implementation of REDD+ activities. The strategy to be financed with this technical cooperation operation is a requirement for Guatemala to access this and other sources of climate finance to advance these priorities (e.g., the Green Climate Fund). These actions also represent one of the most significant contributions to its <u>Nationally Determined Contribution</u> under the Paris Agreement.
- 2.3 The Forest Carbon Partnership Facility (FCPF) was created in 2008 as a global partnership to assist developing countries in meeting their REDD+ objectives. In 2013, Guatemala accessed US\$3.8 million from the FCPF under technical cooperation operation ATN/FP-14012-GU (GU-T1194), to finance the first phase of preparation of the REDD+ National Strategy. The executing agency of the operation is the Ministry of Environment and Natural Resources (MARN), which coordinates preparation of the Strategy through the Interagency Coordination Group (GCI).²
- 2.4 The execution of technical cooperation operation ATN/FP-14012-GU has contributed to several achievements, which include: (i) awareness and engagement processes with public sector stakeholders; (ii) preparation of the plan and initial implementation of the REDD+ consultation; (iii) development of tools for the FCPF common approach to environmental and social safeguards;³ (iv) preparation of the national safeguards approach; (v) creation of the gender and REDD+ roadmap (vi) determination of baseline emissions for the three REDD+ measurements;⁴ and (vii) design of a greenhouse gas information and monitoring system.
- 2.5 Nevertheless, some problems and limitations found in the first phase are: (i) administrative challenges faced by the executing agency when disbursing funds, due to bureaucratic complexity of government procurement processes for goods and services; (ii) only the public sector has been involved as a result of administrative constraints, making it difficult to include stakeholders throughout the country; (iii) the

centralization of institution-strengthening has limited the engagement of institutions at the local level that play a strategic role during implementation; and (iv) strategy preparation has been led by forest sector institutions, and involvement has been limited for other institutions that influence policy, planning, and budgets (e.g., SEGEPLAN, MINFIN).⁵ Despite these challenges, the lessons learned are that: (i) the inclusion of multidisciplinary teams from the Interagency Coordination Group facilitates institutionalization of the process, capacity-building at the country level, and effective development of strategy outputs; and (ii) joint planning and organization for REDD+ with different actors promotes alignment of the REDD+ process with national forest plans.

- 2.6 Despite the current gains made on technical cooperation operation ATN/FP-14012-GU, the <u>midterm progress report</u> for Guatemala noted significant gaps in the preparation process for the REDD+ National Strategy. In May 2016, the Guatemalan government, acting through the Interagency Coordination Group, therefore submitted a request to the FCPF Participants Committee, leading to the approval, through <u>Resolution PC/21/2016/2</u>, of an additional US\$5 million from that fund (for which the IDB is delivery partner), to support the preparation of Guatemala's strategy.
- 2.7 This operation, which finances the second phase of Strategy preparation, will support the Guatemalan government in its design through actions to address the identified gaps, namely: (i) the current engagement process in the first phase mainly addresses the public sector at the national level, limiting the engagement of governance platforms at the subnational level (Component 1); (ii) although the Strategy is being developed within the framework of the Forestry Law (e.g., the PINPEP⁶ and PROBOSQUE⁷ laws) and the Protected Areas Law, it still needs to be linked to the K'atun 2032 National Development Plan and to public investment and budgetary planning at the institutional and municipal levels; (iii) the Strategy's benefit sharing mechanism is not linked to existing benefit sharing mechanisms (e.g., forest incentives programs), which creates the need for a painstaking awareness, engagement, and consultation process to tie the mechanism into the national strategy, as well as the need to include other strategic actors, such as MINFIN (Component 2); and (iv) the REDD+ National Information System (SIREDD+), currently being designed under technical cooperation operation ATN/FP-14012-GU, must be supplemented by a Monitoring, Reporting, and Verification (MRV) system for the generation and regular measurement of reliable information based on subnational data, such as historical changes in forest cover that differ from national baseline emissions scenarios (Component 3).
- 2.8 The intervention methodology involves: (i) engaging local stakeholders; (ii) aligning the Strategy with public and budgetary planning at the sector, public, and subnational levels; (iii) designing and consolidating the Strategy's benefit sharing

mechanism; (iv) designing and strengthening the MRV system, including the REDD+ national registry; (v) implementing considerations related to gender and ancestral and traditional knowledge; and (vi) creating conditions for linkage of the Strategy to the forest and agriculture policy framework.

2.9 The operation is consistent with the Update to the Institutional Strategy 2010-2020 (document AB-3008) and aligned with the development challenge of productivity and innovation, as it generates mechanisms for multistakeholder involvement in the Strategy design and creates a system for monitoring that involvement, developing human capital in the areas involved and guiding the formulation of public policies to bring institutions closer to the communities they serve. This operation is also aligned with the crosscutting area of climate change and environmental sustainability through actions to avoid deforestation and forest degradation in Guatemala. Furthermore, it is aligned with the Corporate Results Framework 2016-2019 (document GN-2727-6), as it provides national and municipal institutions in Guatemala with the tools and know-how to manage natural capital in a way that promotes sustainable forest management led by communities located within the Strategy's areas of influence.⁸

III. DESCRIPTION OF ACTIVITIES/COMPONENTS AND BUDGET

- 3.1 Component 1. Strengthening of REDD+ stakeholder engagement (US\$1,044,000). This component seeks to strengthen the participation process launched in the first phase (ATN/FP-14012-GU), which focused on national governance (principally the public sector), leaving a vacuum of information and participation at the subnational level and among local actors. It will strengthen multistakeholder engagement and participation at the subnational level, paying special attention to local communities, indigenous peoples, and groups of women, by creating a mechanism to facilitate technical and financial support for grassroots organizations participating in strategy preparation and active at the local level. This entails hiring two consulting firms to aid the Guatemalan government in developing and implementing plans to hold consultations by region, to work more efficiently at the subnational level: one in northern Guatemala and the other in the southern region. Technical liaisons will also be hired to provide technical supervision in the field and support alignment of the three REDD+ phases.⁹ to strengthen the coordination of the Interagency Coordination Group.
- 3.2 This mechanism is expected to improve consultation, outreach, and awareness at the central and subnational levels. Consulting services will be engaged to facilitate stakeholder participation and consultation (logistics, mediation of materials, translation into local languages, etc.). Local governance platforms will also be leveraged to foster the engagement of REDD+ direct stakeholders, to ensure that their vision and needs are reflected in the Strategy.

- 3.3 These activities are also proposed in response to the requirements established at the May 2016 meeting of the FCPF Participants Committee (PC21).¹⁰
- 3.4 **Component 2. Strengthening of the REDD+ National Strategy's linkage to the policy and national planning framework (US\$1,630,000).** This component will promote ongoing, acceptable budget allocations at institutions responsible for implementing REDD+ activities, to achieve: (i) the outcomes proposed in preparation of the REDD+ National Strategy; (ii) the harmonization of policies and national planning processes with that strategy; and (iii) support for implementing the Forestry Law, the PROBOSQUE Law,¹¹ the Protected Areas Law, and agricultural policy focused on reducing deforestation and forest degradation. The technical cooperation resources will be used for specific studies and consulting engagements to help the institutions responsible for implementation of the Strategy to overcome hurdles related to access to resources, e.g., in the implementation of forest incentives programs (through PROBOSQUE) that require upfront investments, so that the National Forests Institute (INAB) can receive public funding to operate.
- 3.5 These tasks will be accomplished by linking the Strategy to public policy and budgetary planning through the involvement of SEGEPLAN and MINFIN, weaving the forest and climate change variable into the K'atun 2032 National Development Plan and budgetary planning as crosscutting issues. To do so, consulting services will be engaged for the design of methodologies and proposals to facilitate integration of the REDD+ strategy into public and budgetary planning.
- 3.6 This component will also consolidate the REDD+ National Strategy benefit sharing mechanism with those originating from the early REDD+ activities, aligning them with the four existing REDD+ projects. There are mechanisms that have been approved through legislation that can be used for benefit sharing in the Strategy.¹² This component will therefore focus on coordinating these mechanisms with REDD+ climate funds and stakeholders, including those with which Guatemala has already begun negotiations, like the Carbon Fund or the Forest Investment Program (FIP). This component will also facilitate the implementation of policy tools, such as forest incentives programs (the PROBOSQUE and PINPEP laws) and coordination of the REDD+ National Strategy with agricultural policies. To do so, consulting services will be engaged to design and consolidate the benefit sharing mechanism, update forest and farming policies to make them consistent with the REDD+ strategy, and conduct a study on land ownership.
- 3.7 **Component 3. Design and strengthening of the Monitoring, Reporting, and Verification system at the subnational level (US\$1,841,000).** Once Guatemala has the emissions baseline scenarios being prepared through technical cooperation operation ATN/FP-14012-GU (slated for completion in the last quarter of 2017), this component will provide funding for consulting services to design a Monitoring, Reporting, and Verification (MRV) system to facilitate the periodic collection and

assessment of data and information on historical changes in forest cover and current/future assessments of national emissions baselines.

- 3.8 This system will help strengthen existing biodiversity, forest cover, and forest fire monitoring centers for MRV in the five REDD+ regions across the country. At the same time, the proposed system will build institutional capacity at the subnational level, using remote systems technologies to compare changes in the extent and content of forest carbon, as well as greenhouse gas emissions, compared to national baselines. These systems will be supported by a community monitoring component, including monitoring by local governments, such as municipios and leagues of municipios (mancomunidades). Consulting services will also be engaged to design the REDD+ national registry and early warning plan for deforestation and forest degradation, conduct specific studies, and develop carbon estimation methods for deforestation and forest degradation. They will also enhance data collection in the field for the national forest inventory. The Guatemalan government, acting through the Interagency Group for Forest Monitoring and Land Use (GIMBUT),¹³ has set up a system of governance and interagency coordination to get the MRV system up and running, facilitate implementation, and ensure sustainability.
- 3.9 **Component 4. Administration and supervision (US\$485,000).** This component will finance consulting services to support the management of execution, including all necessary tasks related to the preparation of terms of reference, contracting, coordination of activities, monitoring and technical supervision of contracts, and monitoring of activities.
- 3.10 The total cost of this technical cooperation operation is US\$5 million, to be funded from the Readiness Fund of the Forest Carbon Partnership Facility (FCPF).

IV. EXECUTING AGENCY AND EXECUTION STRUCTURE

4.1 At the request of the Government of Guatemala, this technical cooperation operation will be executed by the IDB, given its extensive REDD+ experience and knowledge. The country has also requested this arrangement so that the operation will be executed nimbly by a strong actor, committing and executing the FCPF resources in a timely manner, in order to meet the donor's deadline of December 2020. The

Bank is an ideal candidate to ensure that execution goes efficiently and effectively,¹⁴ and the donor agreed to this execution arrangement.

- 4.2 This execution mechanism will also make it viable for Guatemala to meet some of the requirements set by the FCPF, especially strengthening the consultation and engagement of local communities and indigenous peoples. In the past, this has posed a challenge for the public administration, since the Government Contracting Law limits the procurement of the necessary transportation services and logistics to facilitate the engagement of local actors. So that all tasks related to execution are performed efficiently, the Bank will engage consulting services to provide specific support for execution management, including the management of contracting, coordination and technical supervision, and monitoring of activities. Technical staff at the Bank's Country Office in Guatemala will support and oversee the management of these services.
- 4.3 The execution and disbursement period will be 36 months. The consulting and nonconsulting services to be engaged under this operation have been included in the Procurement Plan (Annex II) and will be executed in accordance with the established procurement methods of the IDB, namely: (i) contracting of individual consultants, as established in Administrative Manual, Section AM-650; (ii) contracting of consulting firms for services of an intellectual nature, according to document GN-2765-1 and associated operational quidelines its (document OP-1155-4); and (iii) contracting of logistics services and purchase of goods according to document GN-2303-20. Operating Regulations will be prepared at the start of activities, describing the adminstrative and fiduciary processes to be used for execution, as well as technical processes and the relationship with the different stakeholders, and the expected outputs of the operation.
- 4.4 The four institutions of the Interagency Coordination Group (MARN, MAGA, INAB, and CONAP) will continue to lead the preparation of the REDD+ National Strategy, according to their legal mandates and subject-matter jurisdiction. The counterpart within MARN will be the Climate Change Department, acting through the office of the Deputy Minister for Natural Resources and Climate Change, for tracking deliverables. This department will also coordinate with the other three institutions to provide feedback on deliverables. Since the Guatemalan government is leading the REDD+ process, this operation will provide assistance in the hiring of institutional liaisons and consulting firms to strengthen areas where gaps remain, and refine the Strategy. The resources of this operation will not be used for current expenditures of the institutions.

V. MAJOR RISKS

5.1 The following risks have been identified: (i) limited engagement of vulnerable groups. This risk will be mitigated through activities to strengthen participation and culturally appropriate consultation that address gender considerations; (ii) staff turnover at the four institutions of the Interagency Coordination Group, which would

impact progress on the technical side of the operation. The Interagency Coordination Group has an Interagency Cooperation Agreement and a mandate established in the <u>Framework Law on Climate Change</u> (Article 20) to support the institutionalization of the REDD+ National Strategy. Furthermore, each institution in the group has designated staff from different technical units (climate change, gender, indigenous peoples, international cooperation, geospatial information systems, information technology, etc.) who have been involved in other phases of REDD+ (FIP and Carbon Fund), so the risk of staff turnover is low. The technical cooperation operation will also have a team of consultants hired specifically to support the Guatemalan government in preparing its strategy; (iii) difficulty moving forward with execution, due to limited participation of government entities. This risk will be mitigated by hiring institutional liaisons and consulting services to support the Guatemalan government.

VI. EXCEPTIONS TO BANK POLICIES

6.1 No exceptions are envisaged to any Bank policy.

VII. ENVIRONMENTAL SAFEGUARDS

7.1 In accordance with the IDB Environment and Safeguards Compliance Policy (Operational Policy OP-703), this operation has been classified as category "C" (see <u>safeguard screening form</u> and <u>safeguard policy filters</u>).

The same currency shall be used to stipulate the remuneration and payments to consultants, except in the case of local consultants working in their own borrowing member country who shall have their remuneration defined and paid in the currency of such country. No resources of the Fund shall be made available to cover amounts greater than the amount certified herein above for the implementation of this operation. Amounts greater than the certified amount may arise from commitments on contracts denominated in a currency other than the Fund currency, resulting in currency exchange rate differences, represent a risk that will not be absorbed by the Fund.
